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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Indian Land High School continues to flourish with numerous academic, athletic, and fine arts successes. Initiatives have been implemented to meet the demands of our diverse and ever-changing population. During the 2007-08 school year, we have continued to emphasize the High Schools That Work practices while focusing on career clusters and professional development that addressed reading and writing across the curriculum.

As we transitioned into our new school, we maintained our resolve to keep our students actively engaged. We have learned through research and data collection that this has been a cornerstone for our success. As a result, we continue to see a steady increase in parental involvement and a decrease in disciplinary referrals.

Four of our teachers are now National Board certified. Our committed faculty has been the catalyst for our students' academic success as we strive to provide a rigorous curriculum in this standards-driven era. Continuing with our plan to meet with every student and their parent has helped our guidance department open the lines of communication to foster more positive relationships.

Indian Land High School's administration, faculty, students, and parents shared in several accomplishments this year. We were awarded over \$11,000 for the Palmetto Gold Award. We received an excellent absolute rating and improvement rating and met AYP. Our seniors were awarded over \$2,000,000 in scholarships that included, but were not limited to, Palmetto Fellows, Life, Hope, and Lottery Tuition program scholarships. Our ROTC was recognized as an Honor Unit with Distinction and for the first time they participated in a national drill meet in Daytona Beach, Florida. The student body logged many hours of service learning through food drives, sending goods to servicemen and women in Iraq, and the American Red Cross blood drives. Student Government raised over \$1,000 for Pennies for Patients. As always, FFA and JROTC hosted a very successful Veteran's Day program. The faculty raised over \$1,000 for Relay for Life. For the first time, Indian Land's Fine Arts department hosted an Arts Gala where student art work was on display while the band and chorus performed for the guests. It was one of the most successful events this school year.

This year we look forward to our first Technical Assistance Visit that will provide additional insight into further school improvement. We will work together to ensure that the mission and vision for Indian Land High School is met with vigor and zeal. For the 2008-09 school year, a relatively large number of students have enrolled in our most challenging courses. We are hopeful for increased involvement and support from parents and businesses. We look ahead for an opportunity to ignite excitement, interest, and pride throughout the student body and community. It is our sincere desire to instill feelings of pride, encourage positive self-images, and renew inspirations to achieve and excel.
