

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

South Middle School continues to work towards providing our students with the best educational opportunities available. The following programs or initiatives were implemented during the 2007-2008 school year:

WSMS – Studio SMS began its inaugural year of the WSMS broadcast studio. This studio produces a morning news program highlighting school news, weather, and other features.

Technology for Teachers – Because of the new technology South has incorporated into the classrooms during the year, teachers were offered the opportunity to participate in a yearlong course covering many aspects of cutting-edge technology in the classroom.

Night of Excellence – A showcase of the excellent teaching that commonly occurs in our classrooms, this night provided parents with a firsthand experience of student life at SMS. Seventeen sessions were offered in a variety of subject areas.

Our focus on technology continued to grow. SMARTBoards were installed in every academic classroom this year. In addition, teachers have access to eleven wireless writing slates and six sets of Senteos.

South's students continued to excel in academics throughout the year. Eleven eighth-graders were selected as Junior Scholars, twelve students were recognized at the annual Celebration of Excellence, a seventh-grader won the District Spelling Bee, a sixth-grader was recognized as a Soil Conservation Essay Award winner, an eighth-grader was selected as a Duke TIP Scholar, and several students were honored as District Science Fair winners. Our arts program also continued to flourish with our band and chorus once again being recognized with many accolades that included excellent and superior ratings at solo and ensemble events. Several of our students also received awards at the local art show.

We continued to focus attention on implementing the comprehensive improvement framework associated with Making Middle Grades Work. Sixty eighth-graders were randomly selected and tested using the National Assessment of Educational Progress instrument.

A South Middle science teacher was chosen as the Lancaster County Middle School Teacher of the Year. In addition, eight teachers presented at the South Carolina Middle School Conference. Two teachers also had articles published in national magazines.

South Middle School could not have accomplished so much without the help and support of our parents and community. The PTO and School Improvement Council continue to help ensure that our students receive the best educational opportunities possible.
