Report of Director and School Improvement Council

The Aiken County Career and Technology Center (ACCTC) serves the school district of Aiken County. It is available to seven high schools. The school ended the year with its highest enrollment, 375 students. The school had 133 students who became completers by completing at least four units in their technology area and were recognized with completer certificates.

ACCTC had 104 students complete industry certifications in electricity, mechatronics, welding, nail technology, cosmetology, criminal justice, and health science.

ACCTC is not only committed to making sure students have the technical skills they need but has also made strides towards improving the soft skills students need to be competitive in industry. ACCTC has created a class called Professionalism 101 to focus on soft skills and has created a Capstone Project for completers. The Career Center has also been an active member of Technical Centers That Work.

Health science had one student place in the top ten in the First Aide and Rescue Breathing competition at the National HOSA competition and the Criminal Justice program's Crime Scene Investigation team placed first at the National SkillsUSA competition. Cosmetology, Nail Technology, Computer Aided Drafting, FFA, and Health Science all had medalists at state competitions.

The largest class in the history of ACCTC, 43, was inducted into the National Technical Honor Society.

ACCTC is extremely proud of its partnerships with community businesses and industry. This collaborative effort continues to pay dividends for the students and the community. The Career Center is proud of the outstanding effort put forth by students and faculty.
