Leslie Martin was named Crescent's Teacher of the Year. She also received a \$2000 EIA teacher grant that funded Sophomore Academy trips. Gerald Gates received a \$1000 Science of Speed grant. Charlene Mullikin received the prestigious National Board Certification. Deborah Jordan and Debbie Thrasher expanded the "We're Booked at CHS" book club to include faculty, staff, and students.

Our Media Center hosted Banned Books Week, Teen Read Week, The Scholastic Book Fair Blizzard, the annual Poetry Slam, and the International Fair.

Three new classes were added to our master schedule - Fashion, Fabric and Design; Web Page Design; and Multimedia Applications.

Our FFA Chapter was awarded their second consecutive Gold Chapter Award. Girls' softball won their 23rd consecutive region championship and their 18th state championship.

Our senior class received over 2.2 million dollars in scholarships. There were 41 Life Scholarship winners and 4 Palmetto Fellows.

We look forward to continuing to serve the young people of the Starr, Iva, and Flat Rock communities by offering them a challenging and diverse curriculum and the opportunity to participate in a wide range of extracurricular activities.
