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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

High expectations have been placed upon the administration, faculty, staff, and students of Chester High School. These expectations are being met and exceeded. In 2008-2009, CHS excelled in academics, arts, athletics, and extracurricular activities. Our students have continued to push us to provide our best as evidenced by the number of recipients of life scholarships and enrollment in advanced placement courses.

The vital task of scheduling students has continued to improve. Guidance met individually with every 9th and 10th grade student and assisted them in the development of Individual Graduation Plans. These plans guided students through choices needed to determine planning, research, and organization of future college and career opportunities.

Discipline incidents and expulsions have decreased and efforts to involve parents have become more effective with the use of SchoolConnects. Teachers documented and tracked parent conferences more accurately this year with the use of the conference atom in the SASI program. The use of technology was also enhanced in the classroom through increased professional development training and the addition of new Promethean Boards.

The School Improvement Council continued to give voice to parent, student, faculty, and community concerns at Chester High School. The council remained active in planning and supporting improvements at our school. The council continued to emphasize parent and community involvement through ongoing outreach projects. Physical improvements undertaken this year will enhance student safety, timely faculty communication, and the students' learning environment. The council hopes to see consistent support for these programs in the future as they celebrate the receipt of our Palmetto Gold recognition and plan for continued positive achievements in the future.
