

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Hopkins Middle School, a Flagship School of Promise, has maintained an average student population of 430 students for the 2008-2009 school year. Hopkins Middle has focused on several goals and objectives, which centered on continuous improvement through technology integration, data-driven decisions, monthly professional development for teachers, and enhanced public relations that showcased positive, innovative programs.

Hopkins Middle implemented several initiatives to intensify instructional delivery. Teachers used common planning times to collaborate and develop aligned assessments. Our newly established literacy block allows daily instruction of reading strategies. Data from MAP testing was used to group students and to provide individualized information on students' academic strengths and weaknesses in math and reading. Hopkins Middle has acquired five computer labs and a Computer Modular lab that features robotics, forensic science, computer animation, etc. NASA'S Distance Learning Lab was used to promote science lessons with the Richland One Challenger Learning Center. All core-content classrooms have Smartboards, Wireless slates, and access to Senteo systems. The Comprehensive Remediation After-School Program and Saturday PASS Academy provided additional academic assistance. Weekly school-wide Academic Enrichment instruction targeted specific areas that mandated growth noted by MAP scores and benchmark assessments.

Hopkins Middle has strived to increase parental involvement. Parents participated and enjoyed Political Night, performing arts presentations, Reading/Math Night, 6th Grade Orientation, Science Night, and PASS Preparation/Transition Night. We have established business partnerships with The State newspaper, Westinghouse, Lower Richland High School, Fort Jackson, Benedict College, SYSCO Inc., University of South Carolina, Palmetto Community Services, Wal-Mart, Piggly-Wiggly, McDonald's, Chick-fil-A, and Tri-County Electric.

Our students continue to excel in many academic and extracurricular activities. It was great to note that 240 students met our External Review Team goals in reading, writing, and math. Our chorus was rated superior in a national competition in Orlando Florida, and was awarded the best Gospel Choir. We are extremely proud that 42 students witnessed the inauguration of our first African-American president. Six students participated in the Richland One Jazz Festival, and our Jazz Ensemble received a Superior rating at the Music Showcase festival at Six Flags of Georgia. Our girls basketball team was the runner-up in the District's Basketball Championship. Hopkins Middle School was represented with 9 Middle School and South Carolina Junior Scholars.

Our motto, "Hopkins Middle School Eagles Fly First Class," signifies that although we have made significant gains, we shall continue to cultivate student achievement and parent-school relationships through engagement.
