


This past school year was another banner year for Latta High School.

Latta High School has once again been recognized in U.S. News and World Report in its ranking of "America's Best High Schools." Latta High School received recognition in the report as a bronze medal winner.

With the help of our students and parents, we continued a trend of strong performance on the Exit Exam. On HSAP, we had a 94% first attempt pass rate in English Language Arts, and a 94.8% first attempt pass rate in Mathematics.

We were able to achieve these levels because of the efforts of an excellent teaching faculty, the support of our parents, the efforts of our students, and the trust that exists between the schools and the people of our community. The high expectations of the aforementioned groups have greatly enhanced our ability to compete academically.
