



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## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

2009–2010 was another great year at Lexington High School for all of our stakeholders.

Lexington High's SAT, AP, International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme and ACT scores were well above the national average. We were awarded the Palmetto Gold Award for the seventh year in a row.

Our extra-curricular activities and our fine arts programs both excelled once again.

Academic awards won by our 579 2010 graduates included 166 Honor Graduates (4.0 GPA and/or top 10%), 52 Palmetto Fellows (new LHS record), 366 (63%) LIFE scholarship-eligible students, three National Merit Finalists and \$12.6 million in scholarship money.

With an educational culture that is positive and rewarding and student achievement as the main focus of school life, LHS continues its excellence in other school programs. Our Air Force JROTC program was once again named a Unit of Distinction. State championships were won in athletics by our Boys Cross Country team and the LHS Girls Golf team. The Girls Golf team won an unprecedented six State Championships in a row. Lower State Championships were won in Boys Basketball, Girls Volleyball, Boys Swimming and Boys Tennis.

Once again this has been an exceptional year for Lexington High School.

We are quite fortunate to have the support of our parents and our community. The LHS School Improvement Council, composed of parents, students, teachers, community representatives and administrative personnel, discuss many subjects that continue to add to our commitment to excellence in education.

There are challenges that LHS will face this year and that we must work through in order to continue our success. We must develop student and faculty leaders who will help us face the challenges that an ever-increasing student enrollment and a decreasing budget will bring. Our faculty will continue its pursuit of common assessments and differentiated instruction to help facilitate student achievement.
