



READING – GRADE 4 (2009)




READING – GRADE 8 (2009)

MATH – GRADE 4 (2009)




MATH – GRADE 8 (2009)





REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

During the 2009-2010 school year, Woodruff Primary School (WPS) placed extra emphasis on building community. Our faculty, administration, and families realize that learning should extend beyond the walls of the classroom, and our community provides a rich environment for that training.

Small children, however, need to take small steps. One of the first opportunities for children to interact with the community outside of their classroom is through the Morning Greeter program. Our young students welcome the WPS student body and teachers each morning. Using welcome rituals found in Dr. Becky Bailey's Conscious Discipline© program, students greet both children they know and children they don't know. The children learn not only that they are part of a larger community, but also that they can lead and make a contribution to their community.

Stretching community a bit further, students enjoyed a new reading garden created through a partnership with Lowe's. Each time students attended the library, they looked out onto the garden or spent time listening to stories in the garden. They left the library with the subtle message that a business in our community made their school a more beautiful place. The Woodruff Community Center also sent volunteers into our school to help with fall and spring after-school academic enrichment programs.

While WPS students learned to appreciate help from the larger community, they also learned to do their part. Monthly school-wide community service projects gave students and families opportunities to bring non-perishable food, coats or blankets, used towels or kitten food, even items that needed to be recycled. Students raised over \$3,700 for Relay for Life and Victory Junction, a camp for children with terminal or chronic illnesses.

WPS regularly welcomes people from other schools into our school community so we can share best practices for teaching young children. Future educators from USC Upstate spend a day each week at WPS learning to become teachers who love and understand children. WPS teachers also travel to conferences sharing community-building and teaching skills.

For its preschool program and work toward encouraging a spirit of community, WPS was honored this year. Mary Black Foundation presented WPS with its Early Childhood Development Community Champion award and presented it with a \$25,000 grant that is being used to apply for national accreditation. In addition, WPS was named a Red Carpet school by the State Department of Education for its welcoming, family-friendly environment.
