


### READING – GRADE 8 (2011)

## REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

### REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Lee County Career & Technology Center (LCCTC) served students from Lee Central High School which is the only high school in Lee County for the 2010-2011 school year. LCCTC is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

LCCTC served approximately 405 students unduplicated count for the 2010-2011 school year. The administration and faculty of LCCTC is committed to providing students with the necessary skills and knowledge to pursue post-secondary education or to enter the workplace prepared and capable of being competitive in a global society.

LCCTC offered eleven of the sixteen clusters identified by the State Department of Education. Thirty-six students (completer) earned four or more elective units in a program of study, and twelve students were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society (NTHS). LCCTC had a 100% passing rate for students receiving their S. C. License of Cosmetology, and twenty-seven students from the Foods & Nutrition class received the Serv Safe Certification.

Our students competed in SkillsUSA and Future Farmers of America (FFA) competitive events at the state and national levels. Two students placed at the state level in SkillsUSA in Electricity. One of those students participated in the SkillsUSA National Competitive Event, June 23-24, in Kansas, Missouri. FFA students received numerous awards at the state level in their competitive events.

All completers at LCCTC took the Work Keys Assessment. More than 75% of our students scored at the Silver and Gold levels. Our Electricity students built a storage shed that was wired for inside and outside lighting as a service learning project. Our Foods & Nutrition classes participated in service projects preparing healthy foods for various community-school related events. Our Cosmetology class opened a salon to serve the community two evenings a week while gaining hands-on experience. Our Agri-Science program students participated in service learning projects including landscaping for schools and also held an annual plant sale for the community.

Our advisory councils which consist of local business and industry representatives work closely with LCCTC to ensure that our curricula are aligned with current trends for industry recognized certification and the needs of local businesses. Students are provided opportunities to participate in school-to-work activities such as mentoring, job shadowing, service learning projects and school-based enterprises.

At LCCTC we are continuing to move in the right direction to ensure our students have every opportunity to help them to rise to the level of excellence that is promoted by Lee County School District and the Lee County community.
