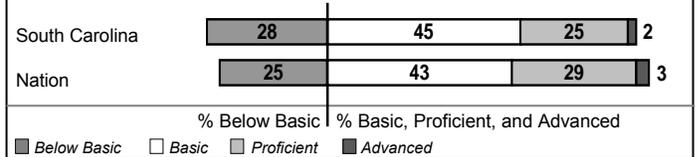

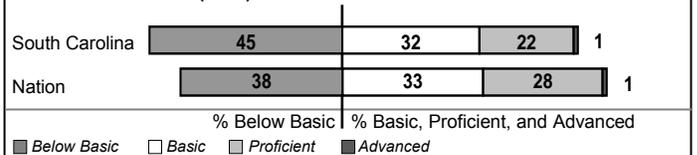
READING – GRADE 8 (2011)

REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Serving three high schools in Sumter County, Sumter County Career Center continues to enjoy a very positive relationship with its business and industrial partners. We continue to develop positive relationships with all stakeholders in the community. The principal remains actively involved with the Industrial Association. We continue to receive grant funding for our Green House Project, and we are optimistic for a completion of the project in the fall of 2011. We continue to place emphasis on rigor, academics, and excellence from the students, the faculty, and the administration; this will be a project that demonstrates the quality of education our students receive.

The facility and equipment renovation project is nearing the last phase. We are installing a state of the art paint booth in our Auto Collision Technology program. We continue to bring in guest speakers from the community to the campus to address the students, and they are encouraged to participate in a number of community development activities such as nursing home visits, fundraisers for the American Cancer Society, and the Heart Association. We are proud of the community projects in which our Masonry and Carpentry students have been involved.

We are also very proud of all the accomplishments our students have made this year. Our Welding students took first place in the state SkillsUSA competitions and will advance to the national competition in Kansas City this summer. We had many students become state officers in the FCCLA and Health Sciences competition, and several of those students will go on to the national conferences in California this summer.

Our partnership with Central Carolina Technical College remains strong. Our juniors and seniors are encouraged to participate in Dual Enrollment, and we look forward to renewing our articulation agreements with the college.

The administration and faculty of the Sumter County Career Center continue to be very proud of the many accomplishments of our students, and we all look forward to another successful year.
