Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

2010-2011 was an exciting year at Long Middle School. The school introduced a completely new administration this year. Long Middle achieved great things in the past year. Its Boys and Girls Basketball teams both won the county title. We had the county middle level winner of the Superintendent's Art award. We also had the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners of the Chesterfield County Soil and Water Conservation Poster contest. LMS is proud to have 5 SC Junior Scholars. Three students were honored as SC Young Writer's Award winners.

This year we made great strides in our MAP scores. LMS Jr. Beta Club placed 3rd in the state in the talent show at the state convention in Myrtle Beach. One student has been selected to participate in the Governor's School Art Program. LMS raised over \$2,200 for Relay for Life, Chesterfield County. LMS had multiple wrestlers with individual undefeated seasons. Seven LMS students qualified for ALPHA summer band. LMS had two students who won the state level Jr. Beta Club Poster contest.

LMS held its first annual talent show "The Chosen Ones" on April 15th. Over 33 acts auditioned and nine finalists were selected to perform. One LMS teacher achieved National Board status.

LMS made great strides in 2010-2011 despite personnel cuts that left the school with 9 less teachers than it had the year before. Students and teachers alike openly accepted the challenges laid before them and worked together to the best of their abilities. We look forward to an even more successful 2011-2012!
