Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



**Report of Principal and School Improvement Council**

Northwood Middle School continues to be a successful middle school with strong involvement of parents through our PTA, SIC and volunteer opportunities. The school’s motto is “Northwood: A Community of Learners.” Our open door policy encourages parents to come in and be an integral part of their child’s education.

Northwood has completed its third year in the new facility and its impact can be felt throughout the program. The building is equipped with Promethean Boards in every classroom, including the gym, two fully equipped computer labs, and three portable lap top carts. The number of computer labs will increase to three next year as Computer Keyboarding will be put back into the curriculum after a one-year lay-off due to budget cuts. Northwood is also in its third year of its uniform dress code which requires students to wear khaki shorts/pants with solid colored shirts. This has had a tremendous impact on the quality of the students’ performance. An indicator of the progress Northwood students are making is the elevation of our Absolute and Improvement Ratings to “Good”. This led to Northwood being named a “Silver Award” winning school

Northwood’s academic achievement goals for the past year were based on the PASS test. They called for a five percent (5%) increase in the number of students scoring proficient or better both for the student body as a whole and for the sub-group of African-Americans. PASS results were not in yet to include in this report. As with all schools in the state, Northwood experienced cutbacks due to a decrease in state funding. Northwood kept its academic program intact as far as class sizes are concerned. Northwood’s academic teachers gave up half of their plan period to teach a character education course. This allowed us to make cuts in the related arts program and protect our academic classes.

Northwood continues to have successful programs that serve students. Among these are the Black heritage Bowl Team, the Invention Convention, the History Club, the PTA Reflections Contest, the Career and Mentoring Club, and the career awareness/character education program funded by the Education Economic Development Act. Northwood also sponsors an award winning year book and a student newspaper. Northwood sponsors the National Junior Honor Society, the Student Council, various Honor Rolls, including the B.U.G. (Bringing Up Grades) Honor Roll to encourage students to always try to improve themselves and their grades. The school also sponsors the Northwood Knight program to encourage good citizenship and respect among students.

Northwood continues to strive for improvement for its students through our yearly self-evaluation Portfolio for Continuous Improvement model. Professional Development for the staff and communication with home continues to be focal points for our school.
