Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Attitude determines altitude...it matters! This was the prevalent theme at Clover Middle School throughout the 2010-2011 school year. Even though the year ushered in a totally new administration, the same commitment to excellence prevailed.

A high end-of-course exam passage rate in English 1 and Algebra 1, identification of 21 Junior Scholars, as well as award-winning LEGO Robotics and MathCounts teams, were a few examples of Clover Middle School's academic accolades. Clover Middle also provided support for students needing extra help through the efforts of SOAR classes, morning and lunch study tables, and before- and after-school peer tutoring sponsored by the National Junior Honor Society.

While academics were a primary focus, CMS focused on the whole child through a wide variety of clubs, sports, fine arts, and extra-curricular activities. We continued to improve our communication efforts with parents regarding student academic progress through the opening of the PowerSchool Parent Portal. Initiatives such as Seeing Blue Eagles Soar events, rising 6th grade tours and parent meetings, meet-the-teacher night, and registration day devoted solely to 6th graders helped to foster a positive transition from the elementary schools to Clover Middle School.

Community partnerships, most notably through our expanded job shadowing initiative and the inception and continued development of the Gloria Reid Garden, were an important part of Clover Middle School life.

Our parent group, PALs (Parents As Leaders) continued to thrive and support our students and teachers. Their fund-raising efforts provided opportunities for student recognition and reward.

Together, our students, teachers, administrators, parents and the community worked to maintain an environment in which all students were provided every opportunity to learn and grow.
