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**Report of Principal and School Improvement Council**

The 2011-2012 school year was an extremely productive one at Laurens District 55 High School. Mr. Wayne McIntosh, in his fourth year as principal, continued leading the faculty through intense data analysis in order to positively affect student achievement by using the data to guide classroom instruction and individual student remediation plans. The professional development offered to the faculty this year centered around benchmark testing, instructional strategies for the standards-based classroom and communal planning. Teachers worked in departmental teams to develop more effective assessments that increased rigor for students. Willa Johnson served as Teacher of the Year for our school this year and represented the faculty in an extremely professional manner. Mrs. Johnson was also named Laurens School District 55 Teacher of the Year. LDHS received two grants to help at-risk students find success. Teachers also held homework study sessions for all core subject areas for ninth grade students after school. In addition to numerous sporting and extracurricular recognitions this year, LDHS was named an AP Honor Roll School by the College Board. It was also an excellent year for scholarship recipients. The Class of 2012 earned in excess of two million dollars in scholarship funds. While much progress was made this year, we look forward to the challenges ahead as we continue to strive for higher student achievement.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
