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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Union County High School's theme for 2011-2012 was "One Mission, One Family: To Create the Best Quality Education for All Students." Once again, we had exceptional performances from our students in GT Music, Concert Band, Marching Band, Chorus, and Drama. Our Visual and Performing Arts programs continued to excel in state-wide competition: the UCHS Concert Band received an excellent rating at the SCBDA Concert Festival; the Indoor Percussion Band finished in 4th place at the Carolina Indoor Performance Association Championships; the Chorus received an excellent rating at the Carowinds Festival of Music; drama students won awards from the SC Theatre Association; and art students were recognized for their work at local art exhibits and at the state fair. Additionally, our athletic teams performed well throughout the year. Our girls' tennis, softball, girls' track, boys' golf, and baseball teams all won Region Championships, with one coach awarded Region Coach of the Year! All spring sports made the playoffs for the second time in the history of our school. Our football, softball, and baseball teams went deep into the playoffs with the baseball team playing for the state championship for the second year in a row. The JROTC program continued to excel in academic, leadership, and rifle competitions. The JROTC Academic Team was a national finalist in the JROTC Leadership Bowl. They won the Daniel Morgan Challenge and qualified for the George Marshall Leadership Challenge to be held in Washington D.C. this summer. The rifle team won numerous awards in both state and national competitions earning the title of Rifle Team Champions and finishing in 8th place in the Army JROTC National Championships. Two students in the Class of 2012 had perfect attendance for twelve years; six won the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship; and the total class received \$993,000 in academic scholarships this year.

For closing the achievement gap between student groups, UCHS won the prestigious Palmetto Silver Closing the Gap Award. Students continued to perform better on End of Course Algebra scores than in any other subject area tested with a mean of 73.9 in Algebra I, 67.9 in English I, 66.3 in Physical Science, 72.8 in Biology I, and 68.7 in US History. Performance on HSAP improved with 75.8% of students passing on first attempt compared to 73.1% the previous year. Advanced Placement scores of 3 or better increased from 49% to 51%; ACT composite scores increased from 17.0 to 18.8; and SAT scores increased from 1286 to 1338. Our graduation rate rose slightly from 72% to 72.8% while our drop out rate remained below 1 percent. Dual credit participation increased with 130 students receiving 12-15 hours of college credit through dual credit courses at USC-Union and Spartanburg Community College. Once again we co-sponsored a \$20,000 grant to provide all necessary materials and tuition for a welding course at the SCC Annex building.

Our students were able to participate in many clubs and organizations. This year, we implemented a Ladies' and Gentlemen's Club, which centered on leadership, character, and trust-building activities. This club helped students to acquire a voice and elevate their confidence, enabling them to grow as leaders. With funds from our Small Learning Communities Grant, students participated in college and career field trips based on their eIGP areas of interests. Students also received incentives for outstanding attendance, no tardies, and academic success. Students who made the All A Honor Roll for any quarter were given free access to various school events and games, as well as lunch privileges. Our end-of-the-year Honor Roll Pizza Party was a huge success!

We continue to work with the Small Learning Communities Grant to create an environment in which our students can discover their niche at school. We are exceptionally proud of our students, parents, and community for their dedication and continued perseverance towards striving for academic excellence in Union County. We vow to continue in our endeavor to advance in all areas of state testing, graduation rates, and

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
