Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Walhalla Middle School enjoyed many successes in academics and extra-curricular activities this year. We experienced a technology infusion and provided meaningful staff development to implement best practices.

We had an exciting academic year. Over 50% of our seventh and eighth grade students received high school credit in various classes including Algebra I, English I, geometry, and keyboarding. Our sixth and eighth grade students scored above the national mean in all areas on MAP, and our seventh grade students scored above the national mean in math. We had twenty-three Junior Scholars, and one-third of our students received a scholastic award for maintaining an overall "A" average for the year. Our Mathcounts Team finished in the top 50% in the state. Three-fourths of the team members were sixth graders. One eighth grade team member finished in the top fifteen with a fourth place finish in the speed round. Finally, two of our eighth grade students finished first and second in the DAR essay contest.

We strongly believe participation in extra-curricular activities has a positive impact on academic performance. Many of the students who receive academic recognition are also members of athletic teams, fine arts programs, and/or academic teams and clubs. Our seventh and eighth grade football team finished the season with a win and showed much improvement throughout the season. Our boys' and girls' basketball teams enjoyed another successful season with the girls' team advancing to the region championship game. Our fine arts program continued a tradition of excellence. Band received five superior ratings at the State Concert Festival and a superior rating at Orlando Fest. Both the sixth grade choir and the combined seventh and eighth grade choir received superior ratings at Six Flags. Success in our extra-curricular programs is a result of hard work by the students, faculty sponsors, and coaches.

One of our focuses in staff development this year was on enhancing instructional technology. This year, each teacher received a Smartboard or a Mimio Teach and the necessary training to integrate this technology in the classroom. We updated two computer labs and added a wireless laptop lab. One of our self-contained teachers received a grant to purchase a mini iPad lab. Another focus of staff development was data analysis. Teachers created informal plans for every student based on MAP and PASS scores. The goal was to focus on specific strands and indicators of strengths and weaknesses. Several teachers participated in continuing education programs. Five teachers renewed National Board certifications, bringing our school total number of National Board certified teachers to fifteen, and a few of our teachers completed masters programs, bringing our total number of teachers with a MEd to forty-four.

We always appreciate the support from our parents and community as we continue to strive to be one of the elite schools in the state and nation. The evidence will be in improving test scores, student participation in activities, and providing a staff of lifelong learners.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
