**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**



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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Welcome to Woodruff Middle School, where the best get better! is the phrase that greeted 670 students every morning as the student body gathered to begin each morning of the 2011-2012 school year. This guiding principle organized each day as students were challenged to follow directions, be prepared, make good choices, and do their best. Woodruff Middle School has a heart for the unique emotional, social and academic needs of a middle school student. This nurturing environment where students work within teams of teachers sets the stage for success. With strong support from the Woodruff community, parents, faculty and staff, Woodruff Middle School students improved from best to even better. Academic awards were numerous as 91 students were inducted into the Junior Beta Club, and eighth graders posted a 100% passing rate on the Algebra I and English I End-of-Course exams. Twenty-two students were recognized as Junior Scholars on the basis of outstanding PSAT scores. Sixty-three 7th grade students participated in the Duke TIP Program. 185 students were honored at the Academic Awards Ceremony for maintaining a yearly average of 93 or better. Fine Arts accomplishments included an "Excellent" rating for the Chorus at the Carowinds Festival. Twenty-three WMS students participated in the high school band. A student was named to All State Band. Drama students staged performances of The Stuck Pot in the Activity Center and for the student body. 24 students had art displayed in the community, and had works hung at the Chapman Cultural Center for Youth Art Month; WMS artists took 1st place honors in the Spartanburg Soil and Water Conservation and the Piedmont Interstate Fair competitions, as well as earned an overall 1st place in the African-American Young Artist Renaissance competition; one artist earned national recognition as a Top Ten finisher in the CelebratingArt.com competition. In athletics, 285 students participated in middle school sports with another 93 participating in junior varsity and varsity teams. 29 students received Edward Jones' Athlete of the Week recognition. During fall and winter sports, 72% of our student athletes were named All Academic, and 13 athletes were named All Conference. School activities and events included extended-day Academic Focus groups and approximately 300 students selected as "Student of the Month" by teachers. Eighth graders continued the annual event, "Cubs Go to College," and toured area college campuses. A Media Center program, Real Men Read, invited guest speakers from area government and businesses to encourage student reading. Additionally, Woodruff Middle School students raised funds for cancer research in the local Relay for Life event. Our students made contributions to Helping Hands Ministry, the Humane Society, Coops for Troops, and Operation Christmas Child as well as contributing to the special needs of some of our faculty and students. Student Council representatives assisted Woodruff Primary School students with reading and writing activities. Woodruff Middle School is committed to serving the needs of our community and its students by educating them academically, socially and through extracurricular activities. In this school climate of high expectations-coupled with a caring, supportive staff-students lived up to the motto: Welcome to Woodruff Middle School, where the best get better!

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
