


PLACEMENT RATE

REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The mission of Lee County Career & Technology Center; an occupational and technical facility, is to prepare all students for success in the global marketplace through innovative strategies and resources. During the 2012-2013 school year, our school served 437 students an unduplicated count from Lee Central High School, which is the only public high school in Lee County. Lee County Career & Technology Center (LCCTC) is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

We provide courses in ten of the sixteen National Clusters of Study: Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, Architecture and Construction, Business Management and Administration, Education and Training, Health Science, Human Services/Family and Consumer Sciences, Manufacturing, Marketing, Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, Transportation, Distribution and Logistics.

Students were encouraged to participate in student organizations related to their programs. Chapters of DECA, HOSA, FFA and SkillsUSA provided opportunities for leadership and competition on the local, state, and national level. Our DECA Organization was the only school in the state to meet both the promotional and community service campaign requirements. They were also recognized at the Achievement Level for South Carolina. Students had opportunities to participate in school-to-work activities including internships, service learning projects, and school-based enterprises. LCCTC students earned work-based credit operating the school student branch of SAFE Federal Credit Union located at Lee Central High School.

The FFA Chapter continues to be involved in many community activities. Students attended numerous FFA events and competitions. One student finished second in the South Carolina Automobile Dealership Association Student Skills Competition.

One of our Marketing students was selected as the Technology Champion for the Santee-Lynches Region and will be recognized at the 2013 Education and Business Summit in Greenville, S. C.

Forty-seven students were Gold Seal recipients for their excellent performance as program completers on May 17, 2013. They received certificates and gold medallions. Twenty-one students were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society.

Twenty-three students earned national/industry certification during the 2012-2013 school year, such as ServSafe; Cosmetology Licensing, and CPR/First Aid/AED. All of our program completers took the WorkKeys Assessment which is a requirement for completers. The opportunity for these students to obtain these certifications will help them to become more marketable as they leave high school and enter the world of work. LCCTC faculty is committed to providing students with the necessary skills and knowledge to pursue post-secondary education and to enter the workplace capable and also prepared to complete those tasks that will be required of them.
