Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This has been a very successful year at Draytonville Elementary. The school received the 2012-2013 General Performance Palmetto Silver Award and had an ESEA Federal Accountability System grade of "A" (96.6). This is a testament to the hard work on behalf of the students and staff of Draytonville. Mrs. Linda Ramsey was selected as Teacher of the Year, while Mrs. Lisa Lancaster served as the Distinguished Teacher of Reading.

In 2012, our school received an absolute rating of average, and a growth rate of good. In an effort to improve our scores, all students were assessed using the Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) testing in the fall and spring. This test identified the students' strengths and areas in need of improvement. The teachers used the results to implement differentiation of instruction for students during the academic year. The school also used a Response to Intervention team to assist students who needed additional support in reading and math. Throughout the year, we integrated technology in the students' learning. They had access to iPads, iPods, and the computer lab. All students were afforded the opportunity to use Study Island and Reading Egg software to practice state standards.

Through the efforts of our students and staff, Draytonville was able to make donations to various organizations. We donated to Relay for Life, Jump Rope for Heart, March of Dimes, Gaffney Soup Kitchen, and the Salvation Army.

We are thankful for our partnership with local businesses, and with parents and family members through the PTO. The PTO and School Improvement Council had a very productive year under the leadership of Jennifer Smith and Stephanie A. Ruppe. The PTO spearheaded the efforts to improve the landscaping around the campus. Our business partners assisted in purchasing flowers, mulch, and trees. The PTO provided field trips for all students, sponsored the fall festival, the Santa Shop at Christmas, and provided incentives for the students throughout the year. As we move forward at Draytonville, we look to increase parent involvement at the school.

Once again, we want to thank all of the stakeholders who played a role in enhancing the life of our students!

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
