Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

2012-13 was another exciting year for the Logan Leopards! We integrated TRIBES®, "Acting Right" and "Fred Jones" into an effective toolbox for classroom management. We also continued implementation of MAP testing, with the principal meeting with each 3rd-5th grade student in the spring to talk about progress and testing. Our students continued their community service through food drives, our annual Mitten & Sock Tree, Jump Rope for Heart and recycling activities. We added a "Pennies for People Campaign" to educate students on local charities and raised \$700.00 for the Children's Garden. Students provided leadership the WLGN News Daily Broadcast. Logan Leopards were recognized with winners in the district Visual Literacy Festival Technology/Video, Puppetry and Book Production Contests. Our archery team participated in the state archery competition for the sixth year in a row and organized a local tournament with another district school. Twelve fifth grade students participated in the USC Region Two Science Fair with four winning Young Scientist Awards. Twenty-one students qualified for the Duke TIP Program. Logan received an A rating under the new state rating system for their 2012 PASS scores.

The fine arts program at Logan continued to thrive. A designated ABC site, Logan was again the recipient of an Arts Curricular Innovation Grant, as well as a grant from Blue Cross Blue Shield and our district. Our Contemporary Dance ensemble participated in a local presentation by a professional dance company and our Steel Band performed throughout the city. Logan sponsored the fourth annual Logan Elementary Choral Festival with the participation of eight other area schools. Three of the eight elementary finalists in the "Best Singer in the District" competition were from Logan, as was the overall winner of the elementary division. Logan's Honor Choir was selected to perform at the SC Arts Commission Legislative Luncheon and invited to appear in Piccolo Spoleto in the spring. Logan continued its partnership with the USC theater department and finished the year with two Leopards Live concerts for the community, one for choral and strings music, the other dance and steel band.

Professional development for the Logan staff this year included sessions in coaching for the principal and CRT, math and ELA coaches working with all 1st-5th grade traditional teachers, working on arts integration and collaborating on RTI (Response to Intervention) and MAP results. Teachers at all grade levels met regularly to look at and/or revise plans, and to become familiar with Common Core Standards.

Parents attended conferences throughout the year, participated in SIC and PTA meetings and projects, helped set student goals and attended Books & Breakfast and Family Night activities. The PTA sponsored Family Night activities, book fairs, and launched plans with the Foundation for celebrating Logan's Centennial in 2013-14. The SIC worked on the Annual School Report, sponsored College Days to promote a continuing education atmosphere among students and coordinated the implementation of the Fresh Fruits and Vegetable Program they sponsored.

Primary challenges for Logan in the coming year include below grade level readers, the achievement of our special needs students and motivating students to make academic achievement a priority. Plans include continued training in Response to Intervention, Rigor and Relevance and in the new Common Core standards for our staff to help strengthen instruction.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
