REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

McCormick Elementary School achieved significant progress during the 2012-2013 school year. A Title 1 school and home to almost three hundred and seventy-five students in grades three through five, McCormick Elementary is committed to meeting the academic, social, emotional and physical needs of students. This year we continued to utilize the Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI) approach to classroom instruction. In addition, we focused on developing and strengthening instructional teams through collaboration which centered on learning and student results. We also implemented Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports to improve academic and behavioral outcomes for students.

Teachers at McCormick Elementary School continued to challenge students with research-based instructional practices such as the Balanced Literacy and Balanced Math model, computer assisted instruction in reading and math (SuccessMaker, KidBiz 3000 and Accelerated Reader) and small group intervention programs using Everyday Math and SRA Corrective Reading. Students also received additional time and support in the early morning and after-school reading and math programs. The Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for writing, speaking and listening were also implemented in all grade levels as students were expected to compose arguments and opinions, informative/explanatory pieces and narrative texts.

Professional development focused on implementing the CCSS instructional shifts in English Language Arts and Math. Teachers participated in and provided training on how best to bridge the gap between the CCSS and the South Carolina State Standards. Professional Learning Community meetings also focused on analyzing student work samples to identify strengths and weaknesses in student learning and to discuss how to build upon those strengths and weaknesses to improve student outcomes. RIT scores and other data sources were used to improve teaching and learning.

A committed faculty and staff, in addition to the PTO, SIC, involved parents, volunteers and generous business, faith-based and community partners can be credited with the progress made at McCormick Elementary School. These partnerships were critical in supporting the academic, social, emotional and physical needs of our students.

McCormick Elementary School will continue to strive towards excellence for our students, staff and community by promoting a positive and productive learning environment dedicated to the success of our students.
