




READING - GRADE 8 (2013)

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Swansea High School's mission is to "Ensure student performance at the highest level" by making learning needs of students the primary focus of all decisions. The Swansea High School community works collaboratively to achieve excellence in academics, the arts, athletics, and responsible citizenship. The faculty implemented strategies from our strategic plan to continue improvement in graduation rate, End-of-Course passage rate and school climate. Swansea High School earned a rating of 'good' for the 2013 school year and a Palmetto Gold Award for academic improvement.

Strategies to improve academic achievement included the addition of more advanced placement and dual credit offerings to provide students the opportunity to receive college credit in courses requiring rigorous academic work. Teacher teams worked collaboratively to create a rigorous curriculum for all. Content recovery was offered for students to ensure mastery of learning goals.

Swansea High School's accomplishments for 2013-2014 include state recognitions in Beta Club, Health Occupations Student of America, and Future Farmers of America. The Jobs for America's Graduates career program earned the 'Above and Beyond' award for community service as well as first place in team challenge events. Our Special Olympics team and their unified partners also competed at various athletic events winning numerous gold, silver, and bronze medals.

Swansea High School continues the tradition of excellence in extracurricular and co-curricular activities which are integral parts of a well-rounded school experience. The Swansea High School Marching Band received a superior rating at Concert Festival, a first place finish in the 3A Lower State Championships and a second place finish in the 3A State Marching Band Competition. The choral program received an excellent rating at the State Choral Festival. JROTC students earned \$200,000 in scholarships. Eight of eleven school sports teams made the playoffs in 2013-2014, with a region 5AA championships in wrestling. In addition to team and organization recognition, numerous students were selected as All-Region, All-Area and All-State performers.

As we move into the 2014-2015 school year, Swansea High School is committed to ensuring student success both academically and as school citizens. Our future goals include increasing student achievement in all content areas, increasing the graduation rate, and utilizing a Positive Behavior Intervention Support model to enhance school climate and student behavior. We look forward to working with students, parents, and the community to ensure all students achieve.
