

Our district is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by including them in our beliefs as guidelines for programmatic and policy development as well as instructional and curricular decisions. Teachers promote creativity and innovation, critical thinking and problem solving, and collaboration and teamwork through project-based learning and participation in STEM activities including LEGO League competitions and Project Lead the Way courses. We proudly recognize the LEGO League at Sims Middle School for advancing to state finals in their second year of competition. We participate in High Schools That Work and Making Middle Schools Work, both of which promote world class skills. We offer eleven AP courses, and we partner with three local colleges and universities to provide dual credit courses. Our district is one of six in SC partnering with the Upstate Writing Project at Clemson University for staff development in teaching writing through the National Writing Project's College-Ready Writers Program. Media specialists and teachers collaborate to ensure students use media and technology effectively. We purchased laptop carts for sixth grade students and restructured guidelines so middle and high school students can bring their own devices for instruction. We initiated our focus on life and career characteristics with the redesign of the CATE Center. The director has added new programs (cosmetology and emergency and protective services), expanded mechatronics and Project Lead the Way, and restructured health sciences. District faculty and staff have participated in courses through the Upstate Regional Education Center to gain an understanding of the skills needed for economic development. Elementary school counselors and middle school career development facilitators use the activities to assist students develop integrity, self-direction, global perspective, perseverance, work ethic, and interpersonal skills. Middle and high school counselors emphasize work ethic and self-direction during eIGP conferences. We are home to the Upstate Regional Career Development Facilitator who serves nine school districts in three counties, and the director of the Upstate Regional Career Development Center provided the keynote address at our convocation in August. 

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


Districts with Students Like Ours are districts with poverty indices of no more than 5% above or below the index for the district.

The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.



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KNOWLEDGE

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
