Jefferson Elementary School is supporting students as they develop world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. Through taking risks, students become independent thinkers. Our goal is to have them realize that their unique talents will make a positive impact on the world.

By using formative assessments, teachers gain insights into the needs of our students. Qualifying students in kindergarten, first, and second grades are assisted by a Reading Recovery Interventionist. Our Student Intervention Team (SIT) works with teachers to develop academic and behavioral intervention plans for students. A variety of research-based instructional strategies are implemented in the classroom such as: Accelerated Reader, small group instruction, interactive notebooks, writing across the curriculum, guided reading, and independent reading.

Through community partnerships, our students participate in The Good News Club, The Looney Tunes Bank, Celebration of Character, and Savannah River Ecology Lab activities. Positive behavior is rewarded through the use of Eagle tickets, classroom rewards, and Citizen of the Month recognition. This year we will implement the Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program to encourage positive behavior. Our school counselor meets with students individually, in small groups, and in whole group character-based lessons. All are designed to address personal/social, academic, and career exploration domains. Students participate in academic and behavioral recognition programs. We also celebrate with an academic pep rally before State testing. Teachers are recognized monthly for perfect attendance and outstanding acts.

Volunteer opportunities for parents include Open House, the Veteran's Day program, Book Fair, American Education Week, Family Reading Night, Science Night, Family Fun Night, field trips, field day, career day, volunteering in the classroom, participation on the School Improvement/Title I committee and our Parent Teacher Organization. Parents are kept informed via the school website, phone calls, conferences, classroom newsletters, automated phone calls, family handbook, the Eagles' Tales newsletter, and social media updates.



The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






