

Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Lever Elementary School is helping all students develop world class skills and life and career characteristics, as outlined in the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate, by providing a safe, student-centered environment utilizing standards based curriculum. The purpose of our school is to build the foundation for our students to reach their full potential and succeed as lifelong learners. We demonstrate our purpose by challenging our students with rigorous academic experiences and our commitment to provide on-going professional development utilizing researched based strategies and best practices to promote professional growth for faculty and staff. Our faculty and staff seek to build and strengthen relationships with students, families and the community to support the academic, social and physical development of each child in a safe and nurturing environment. This is accomplished with a very active School Improvement Council and Parent/Teacher Organization, as well as through the many parent and community involvement activities offered throughout the year, such as Open House, Veteran's Day Program, Winter and Spring Arts Fest, Grandparents Day, Supermen Read, Muffins for Moms and Family Literacy Night. JDLES offers a variety of programs to cultivate the whole child. Our teachers integrate different academic areas across the curriculum and infuse technology into instruction to engage and help our students relate their learning to real life experiences. Students are assessed using MAP, AIMSweb, Compass Learning, ACT Aspire and PASS to identify areas of strengths and weaknesses of individual students as well as to guide our instructional planning. JDLES continues to partner with USC-Aiken as an onsite Professional Development School. This program offers assistance to individual students, special training and support for the faculty and unique teaching experiences for our "future teachers." We have implemented a Positive Behavior Intervention System (PBIS) to recognize and reward our students for displaying positive behavior and exhibiting good character traits, and have a Student Ambassador Program to build leadership skills in our students. Our guidance counselor provides further character education through classroom, small group and individual guidance lessons. At JDLES we strive to provide an excellent education for all of our students in a stimulating and caring environment. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






