

The mission of the Powersville Elementary School community is to strive to promote life-long learning in every student and to ensure a positive, challenging, and safe learning environment. This mission is exemplified in our school motto, "Powersville P.R.I.D.E: Producing Responsible Individuals while Developing Excellence. Our theme for the 2014-2015 school year was "Success: There's an App for That!" QR codes were located outside each classroom so students and parents could access classroom information. Our faculty and staff brought in pictures for our school "InstaGrand" wall so our students could see how we had spent our time over the summer months. This theme encouraged our students to use media and technology to create and collaborate in school and the real world. Powersville Elementary School is constantly striving to help all of our students develop world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of Graduate. During the 2014-2015 school year, our school took part in a one-to-one iPad initiative in which iPad minis were placed in the hands of all students. Teachers involved students in digital citizenship lessons throughout the year in order to prepare our students to thoughtfully and safely use technology in the classroom and at home. Powersville Elementary teachers engaged in continuous professional development throughout the school year in order to effectively implement the use of iPads in their daily instruction. Students at Powersville Elementary School collaborated with classmates and teachers using Edmodo and Google Drive, and Google Classroom. Students also created projects and reports using apps such as iMovie, EduCreations, Shadow Puppets and more. Students took ownership of their learning and organized their thoughts using apps like Notability, Popplet, and Padlet. The iPads became a tool for students to engage in critical thinking and problem solving. Powersville Elementary once again participated in the Early Act First Knight (EAFK) program. The program, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Greenville Evening, teaches exemplary citizenship through discussion and activities centered on various character "virtues" which culminates in a celebratory knighting ceremony to honor students who embody these virtues. We also recognized students for outstanding citizenship and improvement throughout the year. Our Student Service Council (SSC) participated in various fundraising efforts to support our community including raising over \$6,000 to support Relay for Life and the fight against cancer. All students were given opportunities to support these efforts and gain a global perspective on the issues impacting our communities. Powersville Elementary School hosted an "I Heart the Arts Day" in an effort to expose our students to the many forms of art that exist in our world and encourage them to participate in the arts. We also hosted a "Science Day" so our students could hear from "experts in the field" about the jobs they do and how science is a way of life for all of us. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






