Springfield is committed to increasing student achievement for all students who enter our doors. Highly-qualified teachers differentiate instruction to meet the needs and learning styles of all students. Teachers participate in ongoing professional development and collaborate to improve instruction, creating a constructive professional learning community.

At Springfield, we focus on the development of the whole child by offering various academic and behavioral programs. Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) continues to be utilized in order to reward our students for displaying positive behaviors. Quarterly SPIRIT Rallies are held to recognize exemplary student performance in both academics and citizenship. Enrichment programs, including Advanced PE, SAIL, Student Council, Safety Patrol, Flag Corp, Gardening Project, and Technology Club, help expose our students to a variety of world class skills. Best instructional practices are implemented daily to help our students build world class knowledge. Examples of these practices include: Reading, Writing, and Math Workshop (allowing for small group guided instruction), science kits, interventions in both reading and math, text leveling and technology integration. All classrooms are equipped with a teach iPad, laptop, document cameras and student desktop computers. Five classrooms offer 1:1 iPads. Ongoing data analysis ensures students are being challenged at their instructional level.




The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






