

Our teachers participate in ongoing professional development in order to present high quality instruction to students. All academic programs at North Vista Elementary are student centered and researched based to ensure a quality education. We have implemented several innovative programs to meet the needs of our students including: Thinking MAPS EnVision Math Foss Science Kits Small Group Instruction Reading Renaissance Study Island Literacy and Writing Labs Math Interventionist Reading Recovery Literacy, Math, and Science Coaches Montessori Children's House (Primary, Lower and Upper Elementary) Fresh Fruits Vegetables Grant (Regina Peterson) Parenting Workshops Reading and Math Assistants (1-6) At North Vista Elementary School students are offered a variety of opportunities that encourage the well-being and development of the whole child. We believe it is important for students to learn responsibility. Therefore, we use the Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS) program. Students are encouraged and rewarded for displaying positive behaviors, and take the time to reflect and change undesired behaviors. Students who successfully display positive behavior during the month are rewarded by visiting the "ROAR Store." Students also participated in our Beta Club and National Honor Society. Students stayed after school to participate in Robotics, Art, Violin, Golf, Milers Club, and Step Team. We also partnered with SNAC program to provide food to students in need over the weekend. Our school participates in Breakfast in the Classroom Program in which all students are afforded an opportunity for a healthy breakfast. The success of our school can be attributed to the support of our many stakeholders. Volunteers logged in hundreds of service hours over the last year. These caring adults read to students, provided mentoring, and helped with beatification projects. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






