
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

This year, the students at Olanta Elementary were already developing the skills and characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. The year began celebrating our success of receiving a value-added 5, an overall state rating of "Average", an "Excellent" improvement rating, and an ESEA rating of a "B". Each success became a goal for our Bearcat cubs to maintain or surpass. Each day students were welcomed into their classroom with a reminder they were a part of the class of 20___. The schools the teacher graduated from were posted outside the classroom door and were a visual of a career path to follow. Inside the classroom, instruction included strategies to develop independent readers and focused on evidence from the text as a means to increase comprehension skills. It also included composition writing across all subject areas. Having students explain and justify, in writing, how they got their answer became the norm in math, science, and social studies classes. Opportunities to reinforce and enhance instruction were available using various computer support programs. Our students participated in our Science Expo, a mock trial, and special activity days honoring veterans, trees, history and Ronald McNair. Individually or as a team, each project fostered creativity and increased communication skills when it was presented. These skills were also evident in the performing arts when our students acted in "The Nutcracker" and sang in a collaborative choral concert. This was the first year for our artistically gifted students to showcase their creations in the visual arts at ArtFields in Lake City. Developing character is a key to student success. Each week a Star Student was selected and recognized from each class. Students received positive post cards and positive referrals for "going the extra mile." Our students set goals before testing and were eligible for rewards for their accomplishments afterwards. They collected canned food for a church pantry and baby bottles full of change for the March of Dimes; each time surpassing the goal that was set. Our school also implemented "Dress for Success" as a way to promote pride in self and develop a sense of belonging to our school family. In addition, the Town of Olanta looked proudly at its future by recognizing our Citizenship awardees at a Town Council meeting. These highlights supported our mission, "Act your best! Do your best! The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






