


WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

Our teachers are constantly seeking to learn new and effective strategies to use in the classroom such as: Guided Reading, Lucy Calkins Reader's and Writer's Workshop, instructional technology, Response to Intervention, WIDA Standards in the mainstream classroom, Accelerated Reader, GATAS, Reading Interventionists, research, Rigor, Inclusion in the regular classroom, and Reading Recovery. We are proud of our academic achievement and celebrate our many accomplishments. At Pinecrest Elementary we also have various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. School-wide we have focused on Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program. This program rewards our students for displaying positive behaviors. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






