

South Conway Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of a South Carolina Graduate by providing a caring, safe and academically challenging learning environment. We provide an environment through the implementation of our schools vision: a school that develops the emotional, social and intellectual development of each child and provides service learning opportunities for students to solve real world problems through becoming active, responsible citizens. South Conway Elementary School had an excellent 2014-2015 school year. In "Schools Like Us" our school was ranked 7 out of 168 schools. Each grade level participated in Service Learning projects which helped to address needs in the community. A greenhouse was purchased in order to give our students the opportunity to grow both vegetables and flowers throughout the year to support a campus beautification project. Our school received a Fresh Fruit and Vegetable grant to promote healthy eating habits. Students and teachers also participated in projects such as the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life, Red Cross Blood Drives, and the American Heart Association's Jump Rope for Heart. We were awarded a renewal of the 21st Century community grant for students in grades 3-5. Incentives and recognition programs were continued to encourage students to do their personal best in all academic and character areas. Early intervention continues to be the focus in our school. Interventions through an RTI model were provided for students in both reading and math based upon their academic needs. Our Reading Recovery program discontinued 24 first grade students. Our PTO sponsored successful fundraising activities to encourage parental involvement and provided extra funding for school projects. In addition, a faith based organization partnered with our school to provide shoes for all students. We continued to partner with Coastal Carolina University to sponsor mentors for students and to provide practicum and intern opportunities for future teachers. We are currently working with the Quaglia Institute along with other Conway cluster schools to create unity and consistency utilizing the 8 Conditions that Make a Difference. We are fortunate to have the community support for our school. South Conway Elementary School is proud of the successes and the progress they are making. Leon Hayes, Principal Erin Cribb, Chairman




