Students achieve their maximum potential and become self-directed 21st century learners and leaders, as well as highly effective global citizens.

OGES enhances the world-class skills of creativity and innovation through the study of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics with "Engineering is Elementary," which provides practice in critical thinking and problem solving. Paideia Socratic Seminars, a framework for collaborative intellectual dialogues, foster critical and creative thinking and communications skills, and support our students in knowing how to learn.

World-class skills of information, media and technology are taught through the use of iPads and MacBook Airs to support rigorous standards in language arts, mathematics, the arts, social studies and Spanish. The use of technology provides personalized learning and allows students to make choices and participate in activities such as technology-based clubs. Technology is also used in Response to Intervention to help students fill knowledge gaps.

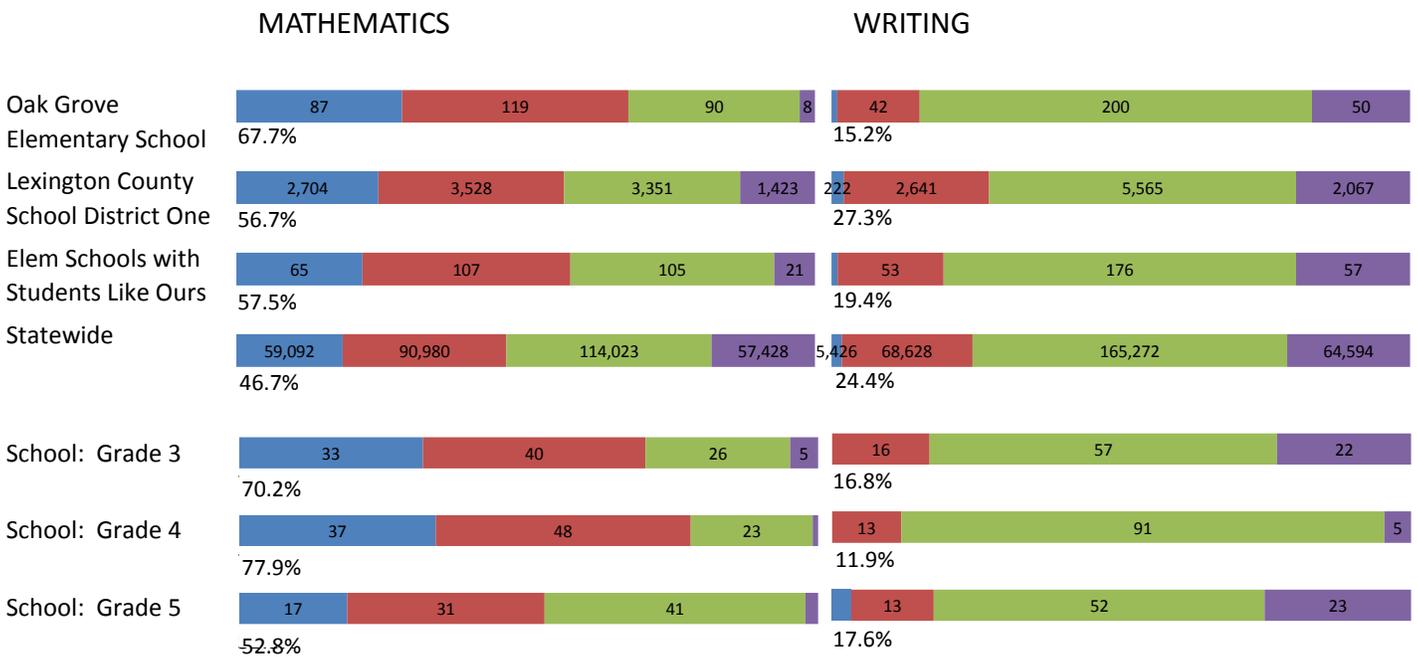
Teamwork, collaboration and problem solving are accentuated through the implementation of the Leader in Me program. Students are taught the importance of Habit Six, "Synergize," the skills of valuing other people's strengths, learning from them and seeking others' ideas to solve problems.

Students learn life and career characteristics through the Leader in Me program. For instance, students learn integrity through Habit One, "Be Proactive," which teaches students to be responsible, take initiative and do the right thing even when no one is looking. Self-direction, perseverance and work ethics are encouraged through Habit 3, "Put First Things First," which emphasizes spending time on the things that are most important, setting priorities, making a schedule and following a plan. Interpersonal skills are addressed in Habit Four, "Think Win-Win," teaching compromise and alternatives during conflicts.

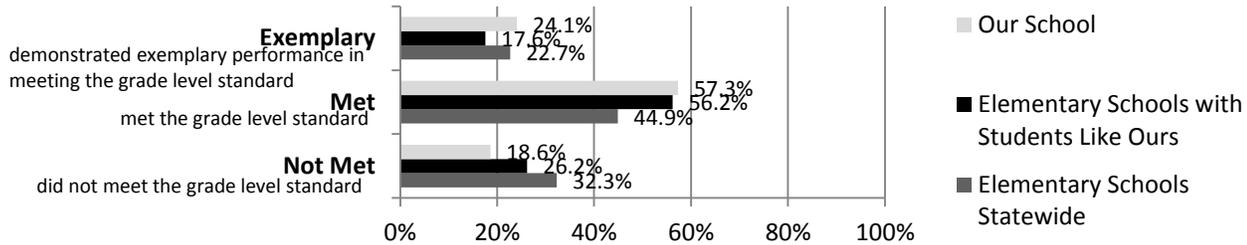

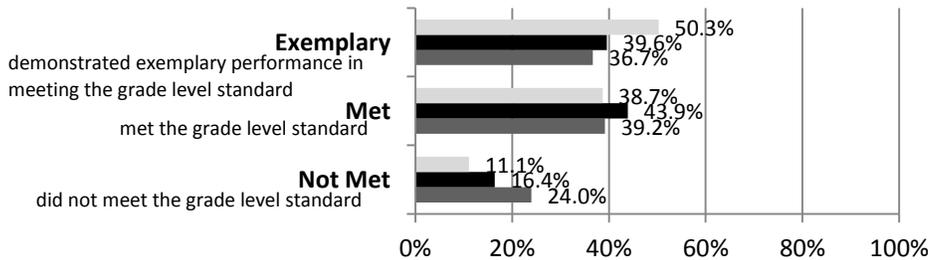
