

Our teachers are always seeking to learn new and effective ways to reach our students. As such, all HKTE teachers were provided a great deal of professional development in order to continue with the successful implementation of Explicit Direct Instruction, a research based, scientifically validated instructional framework, designed to effectively teach all students, in all grades, grade level content. ELA teachers participated in a summer course provided by Spalding Education International called Multisensory Instruction of Language Arts, Part 1. Several teachers attended workshops and conferences outside of school professional development. Response to Intervention (RTI) in both reading and math also continued to be a focus.

At Hunter-Kinard-Tyler Elementary School we also have various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. School-wide we have focused on helping our students to become leaders in whatever position in life they may currently occupy, whether it is as a student, friend, daughter or son or sibling. These skills will help to ensure success in life. This year we continued to use the Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program. We also employed a Leadership/Teacher Coach, who was responsible for providing professional development for teachers, as well as, instruction for students in the area of leadership. Additionally, our 4th-6th grade students had the opportunity to participate in mentoring programs after school. 'Boyz to Gents' has a focus of teaching life skills to boys while 'MGC4L' focused on life skills for the girls. Our guidance counselor taught monthly classroom guidance lessons using a College and Career Readiness Guidance Curriculum. Our newly employed Excellence Facilitator worked with students who needed assistance in making good behavioral decisions.

At Hunter-Kinard-Tyler Elementary we believe the school, family, and community must share the educational responsibility of our young. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






