Meadowfield Elementary School is helping all students develop world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the graduate by incorporating the Paideia approach. Meadowfield is the only certified National Paideia Model School in South Carolina. Paideia offers enhanced learning experiences that promote creativity and problem solving skills while meeting the individual needs of almost 700 students. We are Meadowfield, a leader in transforming lives through education, empowering all students to achieve their potential and dreams.

Paideia makes Meadowfield unique through: project based learning, Socratic seminar, and student leadership. Students and parents engage in student led conferences to highlight achievements and share goals. Coached projects provide opportunities for students to collaboratively conduct in-depth studies of a topic. Students participate in class seminars where they ask each other questions, constructively debate, and improve their communication skills.

Our ongoing efforts focus on increasing the academic achievement for all students to prepare them for future success. Strategies to achieve our goals include: assigning every student a Personal Advocate Link (PAL) staff member; expanding our Professional Development Partnership with USC; and providing faculty with training focused on Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics (STEAM).


Meadowfield has significantly increased parent and community engagement. Shandon Baptist Church was recognized as Richland One's 2015 Elementary Partner of the Year for the outstanding support they provide our school. The school organized a neighborhood 5K run that attracted almost 400 runners. The United Way's Midlands Reading Consortium (MRC) provided community volunteers to read with students. ConAgra Foods donated healthy pasta for our Meadowfeed initiative which provides food for needy families each weekend.

Students at Meadowfield are engaged in various ways that improve their school experience. The Student Paideia Council develops seminar topics and acclimates new students. Friendly Helpers mentor young students. Student Council works on school service learning projects such as increasing fruits and vegetables at lunch, Mustang Trots Food Drive, and the Help Our Family Shelter Supply Drive. We are proud to offer our students Spanish, Art Club, Chorus, Mustang Milers, Archery Club, and Orchestra. Meadowfield Elementary looks forward to our continued success.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






