Mill Creek Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by aligning instructional practices with challenging South Carolina language arts and mathematics standards. An attractive student-teacher ratio, a robust professional development plan coupled with ample resources support the overarching goal of Mill Creek being a leader in transforming lives through education, empowering all students to achieve their potential and dreams. Growth in student learning continues to be the centerpiece of professional work. For example, during the 2014-2015 school year, 13 students qualified as Duke Tip Scholars. A carefully selected cadre of tools including Response to Intervention (RtI) and data based decision making in Professional Learning Teams (P LTs) are applied to teaching and learning processes to ensure that all students grow academically. As reading is fundamental to success in all content areas, students are expected to improve progressively as independent readers through active participation in Accelerated Reader, reading with the Lady Gamecocks in addition to using technology to access appropriate, web based reading materials.

Mill Creek Elementary is supported by a growing network of partnerships representing faith and business segments of the community. Westinghouse and McEntire Joint National Guard each host a hands-on experiential day camp for math and science content areas. Trinity Church provides students with school supplies while Temple Baptist is the off campus emergency evacuation site. A number of churches provide families with after school care services.




ACT Readiness Levels






