

WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

Bookman Road Elementary School (BRES) opened its doors in 1998 utilizing an educational model based on nine body-brain compatible elements. Continuing with that same successful model, our students, staff, and parents have created an environment that is most conducive to learning. This framework, which provides the structure for the Bookman Road school-wide design, focuses on the elements of Meaningful Content, Mastery, Choice, Collaboration, Adequate Time, Movement, Immediate Feedback, Enriched Environment, Absence of Threat, and Being There Experiences for students. The common school-wide language of LIFESKILLS and Lifelong Guidelines provides a foundation for all students to develop a sense of community and experience the highest levels of learning in a safe environment. During the 2014-15 school year, Bookman Road received its tenth Palmetto Gold Award for academic achievement. Bookman Road has also been recognized with Palmetto Silver Awards for closing the achievement gap between statistically and historically achieving and underachieving student populations. During the 2014-15 school year, Bookman Road teachers and students were also granted multiple other awards and distinctions, including the Gracelife IMPACT grant, multiple Sparkleberry Fair grants, a Petco Pets in the Classroom grant, and a grant from the Department of Defense to aid and support military families. The military population at BRES has continued to grow throughout recent years. To help support military families, the school has used the Department of Defense Grant to fund a number of initiatives. The school offers a military child support group, a "Beacon Battle Buddies" after-school program, and several military recognition events, including an annual Military Breakfast and Veteran's Day Program. The BRES community emphasizes the importance of supporting our military families for the service and sacrifices they make for our country. Parent and community partnerships continue to help Bookman Road thrive. In addition to high levels of volunteerism in the classrooms and throughout the school, our School Improvement Council (SIC) spearheaded efforts to increase physical activity within the school community and secure funds to upkeep our schoolyard and "Lighthouse Lookout" Nature Trail; while the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) has funded thousands of dollars for a digital school marquee and a UV shade for the school's playground. Bookman Road continues to "Light the Way" with students, parents, and staff to provide the very best learning experiences for students. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






