Ebinport offers exposure to two foreign languages, Spanish and Mandarin to every student. Ebinport also houses a Spanish Immersion program for students in grades Kindergarten through 3rd that will expand to both the fourth and fifth grade in the next two years. These school wide initiatives are offering students additional opportunities for eventual employment in the global community.

This year we have seen an increase in students making a years growth in reading and math. We attribute this growth to having master teachers at every grade level, involved families and motivated students. We continue to strive to serve our students and our families by doing whatever it takes to meet the needs of students.

Ebinport SIC has strived to achieve several goals this year. One goal was to support student growth in literacy. This has been accomplished through a peer buddy program at school and by supporting the installation of Little Free Libraries in our community. Additionally, our Reading Coach has provided customized professional development to teachers on a weekly basis.

We also set a goal to increase parent communication. We now have a weekly school E-Newsletter and a presence in social media. We plan to continue to work toward increasing parent communication in years to come, we know the importance of communicating with all stakeholders and feel it is necessary to keep this goal at the top of our priority list.



The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






