
### WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

*Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...*

At York Road Elementary School we continue to operate with the core belief that all of our decisions should focus on what is best for our students. As our staff set school improvement goals for this school year, this belief was our guiding principle. Our primary goals for the school year included strengthening our core subject areas of math and language arts, focusing on becoming a true PLC – professional learning community - through feedback between all stakeholders - students, staff, and administration, and our final goal was increasing the morale of our entire school. With the addition of a math coach, we were able to assist teachers with planning support as well as professional development. This in turn resulted in better than average growth in all grade levels as demonstrated on the MAP test – Fall to Spring score comparison. Literacy instruction was improved through diligent use of our district’s Literacy Expectation Guide, along with the formation of clubs like the “Morning Reading Buddies” program. A process for feedback was developed and shared at all levels – from student to teacher, teacher to student, administration to teacher, and teacher to administration. This resulted in a heightened sense of cooperation and understanding among all stakeholders. Finally, efforts were taken at increasing faculty/staff and student morale through systematic processes of recognition, shout outs, and support. The school increased the presence of 1 to 1 technology, outfitting all students in grades three through five with iPads. This enabled these students to have a direct source for current information as well as access to many new learning tools – online sources and applications. Our staff is proud of our students’ accomplishments in 2014-2015. We owe special thanks to a very strong PTA which has worked tirelessly to raise funds for important school supplies and projects. J. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






