Our burgeoning Advanced Placement Academy will provide the opportunity to accrue college credits in social studies, English, fine arts, and Spanish. We also offer dual credit through Trident Technical College. Research shows that graduates with college credits are more likely to continue their studies.

We are delighted with our community partnerships, including Kiawah Island Resorts, College of Charleston, and the Charleston Area Chamber of Commerce. They are paramount to our success as we open the St. John's Hospitality and Tourism Cohort during 2015-16. As one of the world's top tourist destinations, this will be an important part of our student portfolio of options. We will also offer Project Lead the Way Computer Science, infusion of career academies, and all students will participate in work-based learning. We are one of 24 schools in the nation to offer this exciting new course and the only in CCSD.



At St. John's, we believe school, family, and community must share the educational responsibility of our scholars. Thank you for your support in developing our future graduates and world leaders!



Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing



The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
