Charleston County School of the Arts is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by creating a unique learning environment that provides focused arts instruction and rigorous courses in math, language arts, science and social studies. Our students spend 90 minutes daily honing their art skills, and this year we earned national recognition from The Scholastic, Inc. Art and Writing Awards, the American String Teachers Association, the American Choral Directors Association, and colleges and universities across the country. In 2014, over 97% of our middle school students scored Met or Exemplary on standardized testing, and 65% of 11th and 12th graders took advantage of one or more of our 15 Advanced Placement courses. We were identified as one of the top three high schools in the state by US News and World Report for our curricular offerings and student achievement.

All of our scholars are encouraged to use their artistic gifts as they reach out to local and global communities. We were recognized by the Jefferson Awards Foundation for outstanding public service, and we celebrated the 14,256 service hours logged in by our compassionate student body. Our artists communicated their support to the families of victims of tragic shootings in Charleston through poetry, a benefit concert, and the creation of a YouTube video in memory of those slain.


Our staff members continue to look for ways to support our students through new courses like Interns that Work, designed to give students real world experiences in potential career fields and Leadership, a class that brings our students in contact with aspiring artists in Title 1 schools. Freshman Focus, a systemic support class for 9th graders transitioning into high school, includes units centering on study skills and college and career readiness, and also fulfills the state's health education requirement. Overcoming Obstacles, a character education curriculum used school-wide during advisory periods, has been tailored to meet the needs of our students and focuses on multiculturalism, integrity, self-advocacy and respect.

At Charleston County School of the Arts we are committed to challenging and supporting our students as they develop their artistic gifts and grow in their ability to learn, create, express, focus and positively impact the world around them.



Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing




The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT benchmarks are scores on the ACT subject-area tests that represent the level of achievement required for students to have a 50% chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75% chance of obtaining a C or higher in corresponding credit-bearing first-year college courses.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
