
## WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS


With 50 years of history behind it, J. L. Mann High School, Academy of Math, Science and Technology; and Satellite Program for Orthopedically Handicapped Students continues to be a model of excellence in the Greenville County School system. Working closely with various community groups, Mann's reputation both academically and athletically has continued to rise while serving as one of the district's Magnet Program schools. For the fourth consecutive year, Mann has been recognized as a Palmetto Gold School. The Class of 2014 received \$7,523,026 in higher education scholarships including the following: 30 Palmetto Fellows, two National Merit Finalists, one national Merit Letters of Commendations, 9 Sirtine Scholars, and 107 AP Scholars. J. L. Mann has 7 Nationally Board Certified teachers. An "Excellent" rating on the School Report Card indicated gains in numerous sub-categories. Established in 2012, the Power of M program is continuing to be successful in helping to reduce the number of student failures in entry-level classes. Our newest Program at J. L. Mann is New Tech @ Mann. New Tech @ Mann is an exciting high school curriculum with a focus on project-based instruction. Working in groups, students collaborate on meaningful projects that require critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity, and communication. Students determine the direction of the projects and complete an internship or a senior project before graduation. Support courses focus on the technological skills students will need to complete projects and perform in the workplace or at college. Patriot Pride was clearly present during 2014-2015 among the student body during Spirit Week by raising \$146,143 to support the Emerson Rose Heart Foundation and Mann Power transportation. J. L. Mann had a very successful year in athletics with a combined total of over 690 athletes spread across 37 teams. We had four state champions: Girls' Track, Lacrosse and Soccer; Boys Soccer; and state runner-ups in Baseball. J. L. Mann had 27 athletes sign to continue their athletic career at the next level, carried an average athletic GPA of 3.94, 1 State and 1 Gatorade Player of the Year, and 5 All-Americans. With all the valuable strides J. L. Mann has made over the years and with the continual strive towards constant improvement, the school is ready to meet the challenges of the next 50 years with innovation and enthusiasm! Charles S. **Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing**



The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
