

We provide a structured, safe, and nurturing environment where students can excel in academics, athletics, and the arts. With a highly qualified staff, we provide numerous curricular and extracurricular activities to meet the needs of our diverse student population. In addition to college preparatory classes, we offer Honors, Advanced Placement, and Dual Credit courses. To ease the transition into high school, we provide double-blocked English and math classes for ninth graders. For all students, academic assistance programs are provided through a homework center, tutoring services, credit and content recovery, and summer school/extended year. Non diploma students are served in our Occupational Program and Trainable Mentally Disabled class. Our exceptional Fine Arts program includes Drama, Art, and Concert and Marching Band. 

Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing




The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. ACT benchmarks are scores on the ACT subject-area tests that represent the level of achievement required for students to have a 50% chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75% chance of obtaining a C or higher in corresponding credit-bearing first-year college courses.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
