Our School Improvement Council is pleased to share our progress with members of our community. This has been another noteworthy year for WA-ASM in our mission to build a stronger connection with our community as we enhance student achievement.

At WA-ASM, we sustained initiatives focused on increasing student achievement. We offered targeted skill instruction to all students based on assessments in Reading and Math. In an effort to challenge and expose our students, we offered Algebra I and Spanish. In addition, we continued to implement PBIS and the Overcoming Obstacles curriculum.

We focused on providing more rigorous instruction to all of our students with our SpringBoard implementation. With a continuous focus on literacy, we will continue with the execution of a school-wide reading period, as we grow a Community of Readers within our building. Additionally, we offered Saturday sessions to target our students who needed assistance with math and reading skills. Through our affiliation with USC and Boeing, our students have soared with the opportunity to experience STEM/PLTW courses: Design and Modeling, Flight and Space along with Automation and Robotics.

WA-ASM students boasted several awards this year. The students won 1st place in the state Odyssey of the Minds competition and 1st place in the Kiwanis Club oratorical contests. Our students also learned the importance of giving through the Pennies for Patients and our partnership with a local retirement residence.




The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






