Hand Middle School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing a transformational learning environment, incorporating real-world and authentic experiences into daily instruction. Hand Middle School earned an Excellent report card rating from the State Department of Education, recognizing the stellar academic achievement of our students. With emphasis on our five A's (academics, attendance, arts, athletics, and a great attitude), Hand Middle School students receive personalized, standards-based instruction in all content areas. The Comprehensive Remediation Program, Edgenuity, Read180, System 44, and reading and math support classes provide content-specific support and personalized interventions. Hand Middle School offers rigorous Spanish and Latin electives for high school credit. For the past three years, our students have also had the opportunity to travel to London, Paris, Rome, and Costa Rica. Through international travel our students are immersed in the language while studying the history, art, and literature of other cultures.

Hand Middle School's 100% highly qualified teachers continue to exhibit leadership through personal and professional commitment to excellence. A Hand teacher was accepted into the prestigious and highly competitive Oxford campus of the Bread Loaf School of English. During a six-week study in England, the teacher collaborated with a small community of educators from around the world to interpret literary and critical texts. The Richland One Teacher of the Year is a Hand Middle School math teacher and the coach of our award winning math and SC Stock Market game teams. A seventh grade social studies teacher is the SC Bar Association as the SC Law-Related Educator of the Year and the coach of our award winning Mock Trial team.

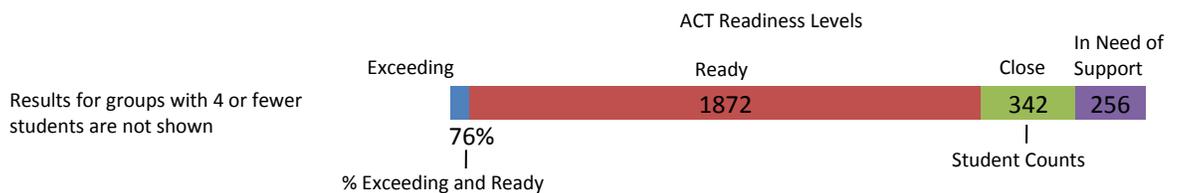


The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing






