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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Spring Valley High School enjoyed another banner year in 2007-08. Spring Valley was recognized by the Siemens Foundation and the College Board as one of the top 50 high schools in the United States based on its AP participation and performance. Spring Valley was also named a Showcase School by the State Department of Education. Our academic successes have been tremendous. Spring Valley's SAT, ACT, and AP scores were all above the national average. Our academic teams (Math and Mock Trial) were very successful in state competitions. The students in our Magnet Program won over 60 awards for science research at the South Carolina Junior Academy of Science Competition. The senior class had five Robert C. Byrd Scholars, 10 National Merit Finalists, one National Achievement Finalist, one National Hispanic Scholar, 38 Palmetto Fellows, 57 High School League Scholar Athletes, 35 South Carolina Academic Honor Graduates, 91 Hope Scholarships, and 124 Life Scholarship Recipients. This senior class surpassed all other classes in Spring Valley history with over \$32 million in offered scholarships, and over 70% of the seniors were offered a scholarship. Our ROTC Drill Team won the State Championship for the 23rd consecutive year. Spring Valley also enjoyed a great year in athletics as well with eight teams winning Region Championships. Our Girls Swim Team and Boys Soccer Team both finished second in the state. Twenty teachers were honored in Who's Who Among America's Teachers and thirty six have earned National Board Certification. This year an effort was made at Spring Valley to initiate practices in literacy across the curriculum to help improve reading comprehension.
