

District Superintendent's Report

Dorchester School District Two's commitment to strengthen academic programs and increase student achievement has shaped district decisions and goals this year. District improvements in test scores and graduation rates reflect the rigor and relevance in classrooms at all twenty-two facilities.

As the district focuses on comprehensive initiatives to increase student achievement at every level, indicators are showing steady and continual growth. The 2007-2008 graduation rate had an 11.5% gain to 75.8%. To accelerate future gains, the district is in the second year of the implementation of a Best Options Plan that offers high school students a variety of options to successfully complete graduation requirements. The plan includes an evening school program established at two high schools this year to serve students struggling in traditional programs. In addition, Apex computer programs provide credit and unit recovery opportunities; 9th grade academies support a smooth transition for students into high school; homework and tutoring support are available for students; a school counselor at each site is dedicated to working with students below grade level; and career/vocational school opportunities are available.

Instructional technology continues to be an integral part of classroom instruction with the use of innovative software programs that include Apex, Waterford, Compass, and Read 180 that serve the individual needs of students from kindergarten through 12th grade. Detailed analysis of assessment data at each school site has provided the foundation for school action plans to improve student achievement. To increase achievement levels in math, the district formed a math task force comprised of teachers and district staff that have developed a comprehensive instructional math model for K-12 grades.

Our schools and students excel in all areas of academic and extracurricular activities. The graduating class of 2008 earned over \$25 million in scholarships. Thirty-three seventh graders were named Junior Scholars by the Duke University TIP program. Two retired citizens who volunteer in district schools were selected as State Volunteers of the Year by the State Board of Education. The district is home to the Summerville High School 2008 state cheerleading champions. Two high school JROTC programs have been named national distinguished units. District Two is one of a few districts in the state and nation to achieve district-wide accreditation as a quality school system by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and Council on Accreditation and School Improvement. Three schools have earned certification as National Parent Involvement Schools of Excellence by National PTA. Three schools were named Red Carpet Schools for the second time by The State Department of Education. Fifteen teachers achieved National Board Certification, bringing the district total to 149. Newington Elementary's principal was named SC Elementary Principal of the Year.

In this year of budget challenges and overcrowded schools, I commend the teachers, staff, and students of Dorchester School District Two for their outstanding achievements and successes.
