


REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The 2008-09 school year was an exciting instructional year for our Newington family. Our student population of 865 students in Child Development through 5th grade enjoyed the benefits of a classroom equipped with SmartBoards, projectors, and SENEO handheld assessment systems. This technology provides our students with greater opportunities for hands-on engagement across all content areas. In addition, all students benefited daily from individualized computer instruction using the COMPASS or Waterford software programs.

Our 2008 PACT results revealed gains in six of twelve areas tested and earned our school a GOOD report card from the State Department of Education. Our test scores indicate that we are accomplishing our mission of "Achieving Academic Excellence in a Changing World."

Over the year, our community of learners participated in various academic, social, and community activities. Staff training focused on instructional technology, a school-wide positive behavior intervention system, single gender education, and in building instructional rigor through higher order questioning. Teachers attended workshops, conferences, visited schools and enrolled in courses to support our instructional goals. Many students in 3rd-5th grades participated in extended-day tutoring with their teacher. Our PTA and SIC sponsored events, including the annual 5k Run with the Dolphins, Faculty Follies, Pancakes and PJ's night, artist-in-residence Tim Lowry, mini-grants, and the Reflections program. Newington students were also active in service projects, performances, and competitions. Canned goods and 'Dolphin Tree' contributions were collected during the holiday season; students entertained audiences with musical performances and raised funds for the Jump Rope for Heart Association, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, and the Relay for Life. Third, fourth, and fifth graders competed in the Quiz Bowl; 4th and 5th graders took part in the Math is Cool competition; while individuals performed in the Honor's Chorus. Our students were winners in essay contests, the spelling bee, and in the District PTA Reflections program. We ended the year by celebrating our Silver and Gold Honor Roll recipients (all A's for 3 nine weeks or all A's for the year), our kindergarten graduation, and hosting our popular Reading Carnival.

As we strive to reach our goal of 100% proficient and advanced levels of achievement, the Newington staff will continue to implement strategies and programs to meet every learner's needs. Our challenges include returning to an excellent report card rating and achieving AYP status as the bar continues to rise. We will address these challenges through the Title I and Read 180 programs, extended day tutoring, differentiated instruction with technology, and by providing our staff with the training and materials needed to achieve success.

Touching the heart and mind of every learner remains our steadfast commitment.
