


REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The 2008-2009 school year at Cotton Belt has been one filled with lots of excitement, achievement, and challenge. The students were not only challenged academically, but also physically. In an effort to improve student health and wellness, we implemented several health-related ideas this year. One of the initiatives was the "Step Up Club." The K-2 students were challenged to walk/run thirty miles, and the 3-5 students were challenged to walk/run fifty miles during their recess time. The students logged their miles and enjoyed moving their "footprints" in the cafeteria to view their progress. Students who met their goal received a "Super Stepper" necklace to wear. Other activities to promote health and wellness included the following: Family Health Fair, After School Fitness Program, A.C.E.S. Day, Olympic Day, and Jump Rope for Heart.

Improving student achievement by meeting the individual needs of our children is something that we continue to strive for each day. This year we continued to incorporate "Cub Time" which allows us to group students according to MAP reading/math scores. Through "Cub Time," students are able to receive instruction based on their instructional level. As a result, we have seen significant growth from fall to spring in our student MAP scores. Other initiatives to improve student achievement included Early Intervention Services for at-risk readers, teacher training on how to implement a balanced literacy model for teaching students how to read and write, and mini sessions for teachers to implement best practices in the classroom.

Our parents and community members continue to play an integral role in the success of our children. For example, this year's School Improvement Council implemented the "Math Superstars" program which challenged our boys and girls to apply their math skills to solve challenging math problems. The boys and girls who earned the required number of points were treated to an hour-long recess and a popsicle party. Other examples of strong parental support were the addition of our new picnic benches, mulched kindergarten playgrounds, and new recess equipment. Our parents also donated over 800 hundred books during our "Book-a-thon" so that each of our students could take one home to read over the summer. These are just a few examples of how our parents and community are making a difference in the education of our children.

As you review the data from this report card, please let it be a reminder that we still have much to do in order to prepare our students for their bright future. It truly does take a village to raise a child, and we look forward to the continued support of our parents and community to help our students reach their full potential. Many thanks to all of our stakeholders for this year's accomplishments and for making Cotton Belt a great place to learn.
