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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2008-2009 academic school year has been very rewarding as a result of the hard work by our students, parents, teachers, and staff. Barnwell High School participated in the SACS accreditation process for Barnwell County School District 45. The evaluation team came in and observed, interviewed, and provided direct feedback. The visit was a success and Barnwell High School was able to keep its SACS accreditation.

We continue to work collaboratively as a team to make satisfactory progress toward state and national educational goals and ensure that our students receive an education to prepare them to compete globally. We are proud to announce that the graduating class of 2009 received a total of \$3,743,200.00 in scholarships. Eight students were named Palmetto Fellows, thirty-four students received four-year life scholarships, forty-one students received two-year life scholarships, and sixty-two students were awarded South Carolina Lottery Tuition money.

Barnwell High School continues the tradition in extracurricular and co-curricular activities, which are integral parts of a well-rounded school experience. The following teams were named Region Champions: girls' soccer team, boys' soccer, and girls' softball. The girls' softball team was also district champions. The varsity football team was named region 5AA runners-up. Many athletes received individual awards for their sports. The Industrial Technology Program garnered several awards for its participation in robotics competitions. The JROTC unit again was recognized as an "Honor Unit of Distinction." The Student Council was recognized at the state level for hosting the most successful drive in the state among schools. The Scarlet Knights Marching Band received numerous awards during marching band season. The "Models of Perfection" step team won several awards throughout the year. The Debate team and the FCCLA also won several awards throughout the year.

It is our belief that we will continue to improve as long as we work together with our students as our focus. We are continuing to yield the types of program results that will position us closer to state and national benchmarks. We look forward to upcoming school years and the challenges that face us. It is with confidence that we commit to serving our students and community in providing the best educational opportunities possible.
